# **Admission requirements**

General admission requirements for university studies. Students taking part in the course as a part of their Bachelor's degree program must have completed Course A, Introduction in Philosophy and Theology (30 ECTS credits). Students taking part in the course as a freestanding course are expected to have corresponding prior knowledge.

# **Educational goals**

After having completed the course the students are expected to:

- give a comprehensive account of some of Catholic social teaching's central issues;
- understand the relationship between the Catholic Church's social doctrine and contemporary or historical challenges, and be able to analyze the relationship;;
- be able to critically reflect on the social doctrine of the Catholic Church in relation to contemporary social issues such as poverty, war and peace, and the environment.

#### **Course content**

This course provides a historical, theoretical and practical overview of the principles and themes of Catholic social teaching and social justice. It explores approaches of Catholic social responsibility through the official texts from 100 years of modern Catholic social teaching, as well as contemporary topics such as wealth and poverty, war and peace, and the question of the environmental responsibility.

## **Teaching and examination**

Teaching has the form of distance education via the online platform as well as one week of intensive education, with lectures, presentations and seminars. The examination is in part a written assignment (of 4-6 pp.).
