

The Desert Fathers (7,5 ECTS credits)

Level: 1st cycle

Discipline: THEOLOGY (Exegetical Theology, Historical Theology, Systematic Theology)

Admission requirements

General admission requirements for university studies. Students taking part in the course as a part of their Bachelor's degree program must have completed Course A, Introduction in Philosophy and Theology (30 ECTS credits) as well as Introduction to the Old Testament (7,5 ECTS credits), Introduction to the New Testament (7,5 ECTS credits) and Church History I (7,5 ECTS credits). Students taking part in the course as a freestanding course are expected to have corresponding prior knowledge.

Educational goals

After completing the course, the student is expected to be able to:

- Describe the general development of theology and practice among the desert fathers and mothers of the Syrian and Egyptian tradition.
- Relate the rise of Christian monasticism to relevant historical developments within and outside the Church.
- Discuss various theological and philosophical perspectives on asceticism, body and nature in an informed manner.
- Discuss the role of religious experience in the development of dogmas and ideology.
- Present a scholarly exegetical interpretation of one selected text chosen from the primary material in the course.

Course content

This course is an introduction to the academic study of the early monastic movements in Egypt, Roman Palestine, and Syria, from the 4th to the 6th century. The desert fathers' and mothers' emphasis on asceticism, prayer, and obedience will be analysed in its historical context. The relation between theology and lived life will be thematized throughout. The course will also discuss the reception history of early monasticism in later Christian movements and Western culture in general.

Teaching and examination

Teaching will take place in the form of lectures, joint textual analysis, and discussions.

The Examination includes two compulsory elements: a) study questions, b) a term paper. The study questions are written assignments connected to readings which should be handed in at the end of each week. These assignments are given a pass/no-pass grade. The term paper must be 4000 words +/- 10% (in English, Swedish, German, or French) and is graded A-F.
